We understand that we can protect children in our care by making sure the school is and feels a safe place to be.

We believe that we must continually strive to be vigilant, to fulfil this fundamental responsibility. We are committed to safeguarding and promoting the welfare of our children and we have a firm understanding that this is everyone's responsibility. We understand we are a vital part of the wider safeguarding system for children (as described in the statutory guidance Working Together to Safeguard Children). In order to fulfil this responsibility effectively, we make sure our approach is child-centred, considering, at all times, what is in the best interests of the child.

Investing resources into essential training

All staff are trained annually in Safeguarding and Child Protection policy and procedures, receiving regular updates throughout the year on key practice within these procedures. Listening to the opinions of our children, families, staff, governors

- The school pay for the Local Authority to Audit our safeguarding procedures and practice. The opinion of the Safeguarding in Education Team, at the last audit was that the safeguarding at Oxford Grove is outstanding.
- Every year we survey our children, families and staff to see if they feel our school is a safe place in which the children are looked after well.
- Every week staff have a dedicated meeting to mentor vulnerable children and check on their emotional well-being.
- Each day Safeguarding and Wellbeing Officers are available to support children and families with any difficulties.
- Each term our safeguarding Governors speak to children, staff, parents and school leaders to check that procedures and routines are the best they can be.
- At regular intervals our safeguarding governors check that all appropriate checks have made and recorded in our Single Central Record of employees.
- Throughout the year our Health and Safety governor checks the school's site to ensure all aspects of the building are safe and safety procedures are robust.
